IT'S TIME TO MAKE ALL RESIDENTS CHARITABLE HEROES (M.A.R.C.H.) AGAIN

For the third year in a row, we call on all our neighborhood heroes to donate to a critically important cause in our community: The Annandale High School (AHS) Food Pantry.

Sponsored by the Hillbrook-Tall Oaks Civic Association (HTOCA) and organized by **Katie Clary**, M.A.R.C.H. will seek donations of non-perishable food, household and personal hygiene items to the high school's four-year-old Food Pantry.

The AHS Food Pantry opened in November 2018 to serve the more than 65% of students and families who experience food insecurity. Katie noted that in the last two years, our neighbors have donated more than 1,500 items.

With rising costs everywhere, the need for non-perishable items and cleaning supplies is greater than ever. This year we aim to collect the Pantry's Top 10 most-requested items, which you can find at this link, including these items:

- Personal hygiene: shampoo, toothbrushes, razors, body wash
- Household: paper products, dish detergent, laundry soap, cleaning items
- Non-perishable food: white rice, cereal, tomato sauce, masala flour, PB&J

We will be collecting items from neighbors between March 2-16, with a planned drop-off date at the Pantry on March 22. Four generous neighbors have offered to host collection sites in their carports and driveways:

2022-23 COLLECTION LEAF-ING PLENTY OF ROOM FOR IMPROVEMENT

Another year, another disappointing - and potentially dangerous - leaf pickup season for our neighborhood.

As part of "Leaf Area 8," residents of Hillbrook-Tall Oaks continue to wait for our third round of three planned vacuum leaf services this season, happening sometime this month.

Several concerned neighbors, including HTOCA President **Al Sample**, have noted that the timing and delays these last few years have caused not just an inconvenience but also a potential safety issue. Large, sometimes frozen leaf piles begin straying into the street, providing less room to walk safely and creating hazardous conditions.

Al reached out to Chris Herrington, Director of Public Works and Environmental Safety, to discuss these issues as well as recommendations for improvement during a recent Board meeting.

Chris noted that Fall's wind storms and warmth likely contributed to the early high volume of leaves that neighborhoods like ours experienced this year. The He also noted that equipment part shortages affected both the county and its contractors.

On top of this, Fairfax usually hauls leaves out to a local composting facility, which temporarily shut down during prime leaf pickup time this season. All of these factors caused a perfect storm that has continued to frustrate not just us, but the more than 20,000 other households, mostly in eastern Fairfax, that rely upon and pay taxes for this service. So what's next? The HTOCA Board told Chris that we would strongly prefer scheduled pickups TARGETED to occur between November 1 and December 31. While we recognize that exact dates may differ due to scheduling and circumstances beyond the county's control, putting a target in place may improve chances that the bulk of them are off our streets prior to our first snow or freeze. This may also reduce the length of time between each pickup.

Chris also noted that the **county is currently evaluating the challenges and plans to solicit both consultants as well as the public's help in an improvement plan**. The county is taking a holistic look at its solid waste service model, which it owes the state by 2025.

This includes some initial planning discussions this spring with the county's executives and Board of Supervisors, as well as public hearings on the matter starting this fall. To learn more or to get involved, please contact the county at DPWES-TrashCS@fairfaxcounty.gov.

YARD WASTE REMINDER, NEW TREE DISEASE

Here's a friendly reminder that **yard waste**, **such as sticks and grass**, **shrub and tree trimmings**, **is only collected and processed for recycling between March 1 and December 24 every year**. As you get ready for our next pickup season, please remember to place your yard waste in compostable paper bags or rigid containers (no plastic bags) separately at the curb for collection. If your beech tree saplings' leaves of have dark green stripes in the veins or if more mature trees have reduced foliage, they may be showing signs of BLD. Infected trees may also exhibit puckered, cupped or distorted leaves. More info here"

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NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH: WE LOOK OUT FOR EACH OTHER

Our Hillbrook-Tall Oaks Neighborhood Watch team has embraced this statement, the motto of the National Neighborhood Watch Institute, as our guiding principle. A recent incident illustrates how necessary vigilance is in preventing crime.

Late the morning of October 25, a resident of Kingston Drive out for a walk observed a man behaving strangely around a parked vehicle at the corner of Winter Lane and Dodson Drive. Flagging down the car of one of our four Neighborhood Watch members who happened to be on patrol at the time, she reported her concerns. The member immediately drove to the intersection and the man, upon seeing the Neighborhood Watch signage on the car, quickly entered his car and fled the area quickly. Based upon his demeanor and rapid departure, it seems as though he was not here for legitimate purposes.

Since the Watch team can't patrol 24/7, we encourage residents to call the Fairfax County Police Department (FCPD)'s non-emergency number at **703-691-2131** if they are concerned about something they see happening in the neighborhood. We also encourage everyone to keep that number handy and carry a phone with them during walks.

Noise Victory: Car Meet-Ups Shut Down

Many neighbors, especially those closest to the Hillbrook Drive entrance, have complained about loud car meet-ups and music into the evening. These meet-ups regularly occurred in and around the former K-Mart parking lot between 9-10 p.m. causing multiple complaints from neighbors. Board Member David Decker attended the Citizens Advisory Committee (CAC) recently, where he learned that a combination of the county getting its legal ducks in a row, various citizen and shop owner complaints, and neighborhood residents like **Mark Crawford's** letter-writing have helped stop this activity.

Warmups, Kia & Hyundai Car Theft Reminders

- From FCPD's new Auto Crimes Enforcement (ACE) Unit: Beware of "warmup theft". Think twice
 before leaving your car unlocked, running, and unattended. Many think it will never happen, but car
 thieves are out there looking for vehicles left unattended and running in driveways and parking lots.
- Kia & Hyundai Thefts: Consistent with a nationwide trend, thieves are exploiting the lack of an immobilizer chip on some models. Manufacturers have advised owners on ways to address the problem. Speak to a dealership about options available to you.

Information-Sharing Apps to Consider:

Many neighbors use information-sharing apps such as **Nextdoor and Neighbors by Ring**. Both are very good for learning about and reporting activities and incidents in and around Hillbrook-Tall Oaks. Both apps are free and available for both IOS and Android systems.

MONTESSORI SCHOOL EXPANDS TO WEL-**COME MIDDLE SCHOOL STUDENTS**

MSNV will expand to include a middle school in Fall 2023. Over the next two years MSNV will introduce seventh and eighth grade to the Hillbrook campus while simultaneously shifting its primary classes to other campuses. MIXED-USE DEVELOPMENT PROPOSED NEARBY



According to Annandale Today, there is a proposal to develop a mixed-use multifamily apartment complex at 4251 John Marr Drive. A property group is proposing a six-story building with up to 280 residential units and 11,220 square feet of ground-level retail. See proposed rendering to the left.

Developed in 2020 on the site of a Kmart, which closed in 2018, current tenants include The Block food hall and the K Market grocery

store. The plan is to retain and enhance the majority of the center's existing retail.

The proposal requests a rezoning from the C-6 commercial designation to a PRM (planned residential mixed-use district) for a 3.3-acre area at the northern section of the 11.8-acre property. **The Board awaits additional information about this plan**, **including the zoning request, and will share with neighbors once we receive it.**

PARKING REIMAGINED

Fairfax initiated a review of the county's vehicle parking and loading zone requirements in August 2021. In November 2022 it issued an update of a whitepaper, PARKING REIMAGINED, on the matter. The Parking Reimagined whitepaper outlines a goal of lowering the minimum number of required onsite parking spaces that must be provided in commercial, industrial and residential settings.

On February 14, Fairfax County staff will make a presentation on its proposal for reducing required parking to the Fairfax County Board of Supervisors Land Use Policy Committee. Then on February 16, staff will make a separate presentation to the Fairfax County Planning Commission Land Use Committee. On April 19, the Fairfax County Planning Commission is tentatively scheduled to hold a public hearing on the staff proposal.

Some business and residential organizations view the information provided thus far in the Parking Reimagined documents as less than transparent and insufficient to allow citizens to make informed judgments on the changes in county parking standards.

More than eight Mason District citizen and homeowners' associations as well as some shopping center owners, have signed a letter asking the Fairfax County Board of Supervisors to provide more detailed information on the proposed parking changes and their impacts. The Mason District Council has also signed this letter.

WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW: RULES OF THE ROAD FOR FAIRFAX COUNTY

For the benefit of new and long-time residents, below is a compilation of Fairfax County and Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT) regulations regarding walking on the roadside (street shoulders), parking of vehicles on public streets and private property, and adhering to traffic signs and laws.

^{**} If two school buses cannot safely pass each other on the street because of where and how it is parked repark it or move the vehicle. A school bus is 8.5 ft wide. Two buses = 17ft. in width. Additional space is needed for the buses to pass each other safely.

^{***} Temporary parking on an unsurfaced area in a front yard for a period not to exceed forty-eight (48) hours for loading, unloading, cleaning or repair of vehicles or trailers.

Note: Short-term, temporary parking on residential streets by commercial delivery trucks, postal vehicles, and contractors is allowed.
