SUMMER YARDWORK REMINDERS

Many of us love living in our community because of both the natural landscapes and beautifully maintained yards we all work hard on throughout the year. All this beauty, all within the Beltway!

That beauty sometimes comes at a cost, though, as the noisy sound of gas blowers and mowers interrupts our peace. This feels especially true for those of us trying to work from home, keep a baby asleep at naptime, or catch up on our own zzz's on the weekends.

Let's face it: Our community can get loud at times. So please keep these Fairfax County regulations in mind for you and your crews:

- **Know the acceptable hours**: Fairfax noise ordinance allows for 7 a.m. to 9 p.m. on weekdays and 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. on weekends
- **Know the grass limits**: Keep your grass or lawn areas trimmed so they are less than 12 inches in height/length

Thanks in advance for being a wonderful neighbor and for following these simple but critical county regulations during lawn and garden season.

ACTION AT ANNANDALE: CIVIL WAR SKIRMISH



"Surprised at Anandale (sp), Virginia, by Confederate forces." - The Illustrated London News, January 18, 1862

Many of us have seen the marker in front of George Mason Regional Library indicating that a Civil War battle took happened very close to our neighborhood.

So what exactly took place here?

Our community was the scene of a December 1861 battle between Union and Confederate forces around Little River Turnpike, which hosted encampments and skirmishes throughout the war.

Detachments from two New York regiments were on picket duty on December 2 at the intersection of the unfinished Manassas Gap railroad roadbed and the turnpike. At approximately 1 p.m., the pickets observed 200 cavalrymen approaching and unleashing a volley of fire.

With reinforcements, the New Yorkers eventually repelled the attack and the Confederates retreated toward Centreville. Union cavalry pursued the southerners for several miles. A New York trooper wrote:

"We were stationed in the woods, behind Annandale Church, and hearing the long roll beat, immediately formed in line outside of the woods, and opened a heavy fire on them, and charged."

He continued, "They retreated in all directions, we pursuing them and taking two prisoners and some horses, sabres and revolvers. The effect of our fire was not ascertained. We had 25 men and the enemy numbered over 150."

Union Brigadier General Louis Blenker reported that two Confederates were captured and at least two were killed while only one Union soldier was reported killed. Blenker also noted that a local farmer was arrested on suspicion of providing the Confederates with intelligence on the Union position at Annandale and signal had allegedly been seen emanating at night from his farm house. There was not enough evidence to hold the secessionist farmer, so he released him and his two sons.
